The rules governing the hunting of birds

Hunting includes the chasing, capturing or killing of any bird or animal. Not all hunting is illegal, but there are many laws and legal restrictions that help protect wildlife. Illegal hunting can include hunting outside of an open season, using traps or weapons that cause unnecessary suffering, or hunting without a special licence.

You are also breaking the law if you:

• assist in an illegal hunt, such as allowing hunters to use your land or providing them with dogs

• watch or attend an illegal hunt Knowing when hunting is illegal can be challenging. Different animals and birds have different laws to protect them. If you're planning to go hunting, it's important you know what you can and can't do.

Wild birds

It is illegal to hunt a wild bird if: • it is not their hunting season

Game birds

Game birds include pheasants, partridges and grouse, as defined by the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

The hunting of game birds is covered by the Game Act 1831. Game birds have their own open season. It is illegal to:

• hunt game birds outside of their open season

• hunt on land without written permission from the landowner

• hunt on Sundays, Christmas Day, or at night

• use firearms without a licence

Always wanted to play an instrument? The ukulele is a very good place to start!

Looking for a fun, new hobby? Across the country hundreds of folk are strumming ukuleles and singing in groups every week.

If you've always wanted to play an instrument, the uke is an ideal starting place as it's very easy to learn. The ukulele group in Wymondham recently celebrated its 10th birthday and is still going strong with weekly, local meetings and several original members still popping along to play along on club nights.

"We aim to make each meeting a fun occasion and play a selection of songs from our many songbooks which are freely available from our website" says group member, Roy Heatley.

"We are a diverse bunch of all ages and playing abilities but the emphasis is always on having fun and making music together in a relaxed atmosphere".

The group meets on alternate Tuesday evenings at The White Hart in Wymondham where a different leader each session leads them in playing a variety of songs from their songbooks.

"Sometimes it will be songs with only three chords, other times there will be a few more chords but no one cares if a few chords are skipped, we get there in the end" says Roy.

Each week, a group email is sent out with news of the songbooks being played at the various sessions. New members are welcome and are generally paired up with a more experienced player for the first few sessions to answer questions and queries along the way. There are no subs or other costs – the only cash needed is the money for your drink at the bar. The group has a core of regular players who like to perform gigs for free at the many local care homes

and interest groups in and around Wymondham. They also meet on alternate Thursdays (on the weeks when there isn't a Tuesday session) upstairs at The Feathers in Wymondham. These sessions tend to be a little more concentrated on getting things right and learning new songs or practising the performance setlist just to get things absolutely right. Every year the group nominates a charity where the audience may make donations.

"We are very proud to say that over the past five years or so we have raised at least £1,000 each year with last year, a magnificent £1,300 being raised" explains Roy. "This year we have already reached our

Gone fishin' - with Dom and Milt

Paul Whitehouse and Bob Mortimer, stars of BBC TV's Gone Fishing, have nothing on Colton angler Dom Castle and his longtime buddy Milton Lindsay...

Sometimes, an upstart needs to be put in his place. In recent trips Dom, with a mere four years of angling experience, has dared to



catch more fish than 50year veteran Milt – despite the latter's 'it's not a competition' nonsense.

But today, on one of those perfect October autumn days, the empire strikes back.

A light fog is draped over the trees and water at Billingford; all is still as our heroes rock up for a



crack at the Basil Todd lake. With their



familiar lack of imagination, they select their usual spots and,

as the autumn sunshine starts to burn the mist away and reveal the seasonal beauty that nature has laid on, commence angling. Dom is first out of the blocks with a few bream falling for his pineapple wafter – unusually they are feisty little beggars, putting up a bit of a tussle instead of surrendering like wet paper bags.

It's quieter on Milt's peg.



The Floatmeister General, who, for once, appears to have remembered to bring all his gear, has his

traditional waggler out (not a euphemism) but to start with, the fish are disinterested. Undeterred, Luton's legend pours a coffee and settles down with *The Sun*.

The morning drifts on, the quiet of the lake broken only by birds and the occasional blast of a shotgun trying to do them some mischief. But fish are starting to come in to both men and it is turning into a good day.

And then it turns into a very good day for Milt. His float snaps under and he connects with a substantial fish; a tench, perhaps a mirror <image>

carp? Battle commences. Milt is using very light tackle with a breaking strain of just 3.5lbs and he just can't winch this fish in. It has to be played with finesse and delicacy and it won't be rushed. And play it he does, like a virtuoso on a Stradivarius.

Dom comes over to admire the man at work and to see what this fish actually is. But it stays deep and out of sight until Milt persuades it to break the surface

and it's a common carp,
 a solid one as well. Dom
 heads off to grab his landing
 net, a rather bigger item
 than Milt's shrimper.
 Finally it is landed

and weighed and it's a fine, chunky specimen of 12lbs, as near as dammit, easily the biggest fish landed by either of the duo in the

four years they've been fishing together. Dom acknowledges the Floatmeister and genuflects in his general direction as they pack up in the late afternoon sunshine and head home. "Sometimes," observes the sage, "an upstart needs to be put in his place."
